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LEADER HELPS & RESOURCES

The following is meant to provide background for you as you prepare to lead the lesson. To prepare your heart to teach, make sure to Read the Leader Devotion Page beforehand.

Key Scripture(s): Ephesians 4:15-16

Biblical Background

When Paul wrote the letter to the Ephesians, he was likely a prisoner in Rome, writing to a city that was a massive melting pot of cultures, religions, and social classes. Ephesus was home to the Temple of Artemis, one of the seven wonders of the ancient world, and the culture was steeped in individualism and idol worship. For the early Christians there, the idea of "unity" was revolutionary. They were coming from backgrounds where people were divided by ethnicity, status, and gender.

Scripture Insights & Teaching Anchors

Paul explains that God provides specific spiritual gifts not for personal status, but to "equip" every believer for a shared mission. He uses the metaphor of a human body to show that spiritual maturity is a collective effort: the body only functions when it remains connected to its "Head," Jesus, and when every "joint" and "ligament" fulfills its specific role. We have a radical call as believers to "fill the gaps" for one another, and if even one part of the body remains inactive or disconnected, the church is hindered.

Practical Note:

The ministry of Heavenly Harvest often serves families facing extreme poverty and food insecurity. Be mindful that students in your own group may be experiencing the same "gaps", such as not having adequate clothing or stable food sources. If a student discloses personal trauma related to poverty or neglect, follow your church's confidentiality and mandated reporting policies immediately. Ensure you have resources ready for local assistance if a student expresses an immediate need. If necessary, you may use the following script:

Thank you for trusting us. Let's pause and step to a quiet place so we can sit with you and make sure you have the time, care, and support you need."

GO DEEPER

Have more time for prep or want to know more? You can use these passages for personal study before teaching. For best results, try to choose at least 1-2 from each theme.

1. SPEAKING TRUTH IN LOVE (V. 15)

- **1 John 3:18:** Encourages believers to "love not in word and speech, but in action and truth".
- **2 Corinthians 4:2:** Discusses commending themselves by "the open statement of the truth" rather than deceit.
- **Zechariah 8:16:** Commands, "Speak the truth to one another, and render true and sound judgments in your courts".

2. GROWTH THROUGH CONNECTEDNESS (V. 16)

- **1 Corinthians 12:12-27:** Provides the analogy of the church as one body with many parts, where every part is necessary.
- **Romans 12:4-5:** Emphasizes that "we, though many, form one body in Christ, and each member belongs to all the others".
- **Colossians 2:19:** Mentions the church growing as it is "knit together by its joints and ligaments".

3. BUILDING UP IN LOVE (V. 16)

- **1 Corinthians 14:12:** Encourages trying to "excel in gifts that build up the church".
- **Galatians 5:13:** Instructs believers to "serve one another humbly in love".
- **1 Corinthians 13:** The entire chapter highlights that all spiritual gifts and actions are worthless without love.

4. THE CALL TO ACTION

- **Galatians 6:2** - Bearing one another's burdens as a way to fulfill the law of Christ.
- **Matthew 25:34-40** - Jesus identifies Himself with the "gap" in the lives of the hungry, thirsty, and naked.
- **Acts 4:32-35** - A picture of the early church where "there was not a needy person among them" because the community filled every gap.

LEADER DEVOTION

Read: Ephesians 4:15-16

“Instead, speaking the truth in love, we will grow to become in every respect the mature body of him who is the head, that is, Christ. From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work.” (NIV)

Ephesians is a letter written to encourage the church at Ephesus as they develop into mature believers. In Chapter 4, Paul explores how the church functions as a picture of Christ here on earth. By using the image of the body, Paul teaches that each part has separate functions, but are all necessary. While Christ remains the life-giving Head, the body’s growth is dependent upon the connections. When we don’t participate and remain disconnected, we prevent the whole body from building itself up. While you don’t have to be the best or most talented, you do need to be willing to be equipped and ready to perform the task God has assigned you in love.

Paul reminds us that love, not duty or studiousness, should underscore our growth. Love drives our obedience, our desire to know God better, and our evangelism. It helps us see other believers as essential workers in God’s redemption story. Love helps us support “difficult” or “quiet” children in our classes. If you look around your class, there are children who feel like alone; like broken missing pieces, often overlooked and set apart from the whole. Paul’s message here can bring hope to these children, as spiritual maturity was always meant to be a team activity. Because God has equipped each of us differently with various giftings, talents, and passions, working together is the only way we might reflect the wholeness of Christ.

Reflect:

Am I trying to function on my own? Am I trying to fill any “gaps” in my life with anything other than God’s grace? How am I modeling unity and using my own giftings in the church to my class?

Meditate:

(Scripture-focused only – we fill our minds with God’s Word, not empty them.)

- Love – When you share the truth of the gospel, do your words and tone match? Do your actions reflect Christlikeness?
- Connection – Am I fulfilling the role God has set before me with excellence and love? If I truly believe that the body cannot grow “in every way” unless every part is working, how does that change the way I see and relate to the “challenging” students in my class? Which students in my class are struggling to see their role in the church? How can I support them?
- Spiritual Growth – Have you ever used your leadership performance as a way to fill a void, rather than allowing Christ to guide you? How does he work in and through you in church? At home? At work?

Pray:

“Lord, help me to keep you at the center of my life, guiding my actions and desires, allowing me to complete the work you have been set before me in love. Reveal to me where I am weak, so that I may submit it to you and allow you to shine brightest.”

CHILDREN MISSION STUDY

SESSION GOALS

Our goal of this session is to help believers understand that we all have a part in God's mission of restoration. As we read Ephesians 4:15-16, we see we are all parts of one body, held together through Christ. By the end of this lesson, students will be able to:

1. Understand that Christians are like a garden, and Jesus is our Gardener.
2. Explain that speaking truth in love helps others grow in their faith.
3. Identify ways they can build up fellow believers and friends.
4. Recognize that each person's contribution is important for the whole group to flourish.
5. See how real-life ministry, like Heavenly Harvest, demonstrates these biblical principles.
6. Understand the purpose of the Eliza Broadus Missions Offering and how it helps grow God's garden in Kentucky.

Enlist Helpers

Tag team your gathering. Enlist individuals to lead the Missions Learning and Prayer Time. This will engage more people to use their creativity to make your gathering unique and exciting.

Plan Your Gathering

- *Welcome & Prayer (1-2 minutes)*
- *Get Started (10 minutes)*
- *Study & Learn (10 minutes) - Use the discussion questions to deepen the conversation. Dig deep in the Word to understand God's desire for us to live lives worthy of our calling.*
- *Apply (10 minutes)*
- *Missions Learning (15 minutes) - use the suggested EBO video and highlight a Kentucky Ministry. Identify ways you can adopt this ministry and come alongside them in missions action. Identify ways your church can engage your community similar to what this ministry is doing. Highlight the State Offering Goal and your Church's goal. Incorporate a unique challenge to help your church meet your goal.*
- *Faith in Action (10-15 minutes) - Include prayer for missionaries with birthdays in "Prayer Patterns" in Missions Mosaic, KBC's InterSeed Calendar, and the KBC's Church Planter of the Week. Use the EBO Week of Prayer Kids Prayer guide and activity sheet and incorporate creative ways to engage your group in prayer.*

- *Closing & Prayer (1-2 minutes)*

GET STARTED

Hook: What Makes A Garden Grow? (10 minutes)

- Start by asking: “Who here likes gardens or has seen a garden? What kinds of things grow in a garden?”
- “What do plants need to grow big, strong, and beautiful?”
- “What happens if one plant is sick or not getting enough water? How does that affect the rest of the garden?”

STUDY & LEARN

This section uses short prompts to keep the flow natural. Use the timings as guides.

The story: Ephesians 4:15-16 “God’s garden” (10 minutes)

- Gardening Story: “Close your eyes and imagine a beautiful, growing garden. In this garden, there are all sorts of plants. You see tall sunflowers, bright red tomatoes, sweet strawberries, and a sturdy oak tree. Each plant is different, but they all need the same things to grow big and strong: good soil, sunshine, and plenty of water.
- For those who love Jesus, we are like the plants in God’s garden, and Jesus is the best Gardener ever!
- In this garden, we need to talk to each other honestly, like telling a struggling plant it needs more water, but always with kindness and love. We help each other grow, just like plants reach for the sun, so we can become more and more like Jesus, our Gardener. Every single plant in the garden, no matter how small, helps the whole garden flourish. When each plant gets what it needs and helps its neighbors, the whole garden becomes strong and beautiful, overflowing with life and love, all because our wonderful Gardener, Jesus, cares for every single one of us!

APPLY

Goal: Help participants discover how they can be an active member of the body of Christ

Explanation and Application (10 minutes)

- “Just like in our story, God wants us to grow like a healthy garden. Who are the ‘plants’ in this garden?”
 - (Us, Christians, followers of Jesus).
- “And who is the ‘Gardener?’”
 - (Jesus!)
- “What does it mean to ‘talk to each other honestly, but always with kindness and love?’”
 - (It means to tell the truth but always be gentle and helpful.)
- “How does helping each other grow make the whole garden (our church or group) strong and beautiful?”
 - (When we all do our part and encourage each other, everyone gets stronger in their faith, and we show God’s love to the world.)
- Read Ephesians 4:15-16
 - *“Instead, speaking the truth in love, we will grow to become in every respect the mature body of him who is the head, that is, Christ. From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work.” NIV*

MISSIONS LEARNING

Suggested Resources

- 8.5 x11 “Meet Ms. Barabara Ray” Coloring sheet (In Resources)
- Dirt Pudding (Recipe in resources)

Preparation

1. Optional: Print the Coloring sheet, 1 per child
2. Optional: prepare dirt pudding according to recipe, 1 per each child.

Missions Moment: Heavenly Harvest (8 Minutes)

- “Today, I want to tell you about a real-life example of people being God’s hands and feet, helping God’s garden grow. It’s a ministry called Heavenly Harvest, from a town called Benton, Kentucky, and it’s led by a wonderful woman named Ms. Barbara Ray.”
- “Heavenly Harvest noticed that many food banks and soup kitchens had trouble getting fresh, healthy vegetables, especially when it was cold outside. So, they decided to help!”
- “Heavenly Harvest built special greenhouses, like giant indoor gardens, where they grow lots of fresh vegetables, even in winter. They give this fresh food, like juicy tomatoes, to places that feed people who don’t have enough to eat.
- “In fact, in 2025 alone, they gave away 5 TONS OF FRESH TOMATOES!
- “But they don’t just stop at food. They also know that people need warmth and spiritual food. So, when winter comes, they give away warm coats. And guess what they put in the pocket of every single coat?” (Pause for answers). “A BIBLE! They want people to not only be warm on the outside but also to have the truth of God’s Word to warm their hearts and help them grow in faith.”
- They have given away over 8,000 jackets with Bibles in their pockets! Isn’t that amazing?”
- Heavenly Harvest shows us how we can speak truth in love. They provide physical food (helping the body), and they share God’s Word (helping their faith grow), all while showing kindness and care. They are truly helping God’s garden flourish by meeting needs and sharing the good news of Jesus!”

MISSIONS LEARNING

Optional Video

Prepare in Advance

- Make sure to have TV, Laptop, and/or Projector on which you plan on watching the video.

Needed Resources

- Small “seed packets” made from paper, or a simple drawing of a plant with blank “leaves” or “seeds” (*see supplemental resources*)
- Small jar or box labeled “Eliza Broadus Missions Offering” (*see supplemental resources*)

Eliza Broadus Missions Offering (10 Minutes)

- “Now, Heavenly Harvest is just one example of how people in our state, Kentucky, are helping God’s garden grow. There are many other missionaries and ministries right here in Kentucky who are working hard to tell people about Jesus, just like Ms. Barbara and her team.”
- “Our church helps support these amazing missionaries through something called the Eliza Broadus Missions Offering. Eliza Broadus was a very special lady who loved Jesus and wanted everyone in Kentucky to know about Him. This offering, which happens once a year, helps provide money for food, Bibles, clothes, and other things that missionaries need to share God’s love and truth with people all over our state.”
- “So when we give to the Eliza Broadus Missions Offering, it’s like planting seeds in God’s garden all across Kentucky! Each seed helps a new plant (person) grow in faith or help an existing plant get stronger.”

Missions Activity: Planting Mission Seeds (5 minutes)

- Give each child a small paper “seed packet” or drawing of a plant.
- Ask them to draw or write on it one way they can help “plant a seed” for missions in Kentucky.
- Some examples include: “Pray for missionaries,” “Give money,” “Tell a friend about Jesus,” “Help a kid at school”).
- Have them place their “seed packets” into the labeled jar or box, symbolizing their commitment to help grow God’s garden through missions.

FAITH IN ACTION

By engaging in these activities, we can move beyond simply doing good deeds to being a light in our communities, demonstrating sacrificial love, and intentionally sharing the hope and transforming power of Christ. Think of them as the opportunity to practice costly discipleship in the spirit of Ephesians 4:15-16.

Needed Resources

- A large piece of butcher paper or poster board
- Markers, crayons, or colored pencils
- Small paper cut-outs of various garden items (see supplemental resources)
- Tape or glue

Activity 1: “Our Growing Garden” Collaborative Art (8 minutes)

- Set up the large butcher paper on a table or wall, labeled “God’s Growing Garden.”
- Give each child several small paper cut-outs (flowers, leaves, sun, watering cans, etc.) and markers.
- Instruct them to write or draw one way they can help another “plant” (person) grow in love and truth. Examples: “I will share,” “I will say kind words,” “I will listen,” “I will forgive.” “I will pray for others.”
- Have them tape or glue their “contributions” onto the large garden picture.
- Discuss how all these small actions make the “garden” grow beautiful and strong, just like Heavenly Harvest helps their community.

Needed Resources

- Index cards with different scenarios for “Planting Truth in Love” activity (see supplemental resources)

Activity 2: Planting Truth in Love Scenarios (7 minutes)

- Divide students into small groups or keep them as a whole class.
- Read out simple scenarios from index cards. For example:
- “Your friend is telling a story that isn’t quite true to impress others.”
- “Someone in your class is saying mean things about another kid behind their back.”
- “You see a friend struggling with a task, and they seem like they want to give up.”
- “A friend is doing something that you know is against what the Bible teaches.”
- For each scenario, ask: “How can you help them grow without hurting them?”
- Emphasize kindness, gentleness, and wanting to help, not just to point out wrong.

CONCLUSION & PRAYER

Review:

“Remember, we are all part of God’s amazing garden, and Jesus is our Gardener. When we speak truth with love and help each other, and when we serve others like Heavenly Harvest does and give to missions like the Eliza Broadus Offering, we all grow stronger and more beautiful for Him!” (Ephesians 4:15-16)

Prayer:

“Dear God, thank YOU for being our wonderful Gardener and for sending Jesus to show us how to grow. Thank YOU for people like Ms. Barbara Ray and the Heavenly Harvest ministry, and for all the missionaries supported by the Eliza Broadus Offering, who show us how to help others grow by providing for their needs and sharing YOUR WORD. Help us to always speak the truth in love to our friends and family, and to find ways to plant seeds for YOUR kingdom. Let our lives be like a beautiful garden that shows YOUR love to everyone. Amen!”

WEEK OF PRAYER KIDS

Description:

Children will use the “EBO Week of Prayer, Kids” Prayer and activity guide to pray for Kentucky missions each day of the week with their parents, grandparents, or guardians.

Activity:

- Show the prayer guide to the children. Explain that they will pray each day for one of the requests and check the box.
- **Say:** Your Parents also have a prayer guide (hold up brochure prayer guide), but this one is just for you!
- Lead kids to find Ephesians 4:15-16 (EBO 2026/27 Theme Verse) in their Bibles. **Say:** We are going to fill in part of the verse and write it on the back of our prayer guide! So make sure to follow along and copy this onto the space provided!
- **Read verse aloud.**
- Lead kids to complete the activities on the back of the worksheet as time allows.
- Send a note to parents asking them to pray with their child for the featured missionary each day using “EBO Week of Prayer, Kids.” (Sample Note found in resources)

KINTSUGI UNITY VESSEL

Description:

Families can use the “My Kintsugi Unity Vessel” activity to discuss what they’ve learned together.

Activity:

- Show the activity sheet to the children. Explain that though in the picture, the pot has been broken, but now they’re going to put it back together beautifully with their family!
- Encourage kids to bring back their unity vessels the next week so you can decorate your classroom!
- Send a note to parents/guardians asking them to complete the activity as a family. (Sample Note found in resources)

DAY 06 PRAYING FOR SALVATION

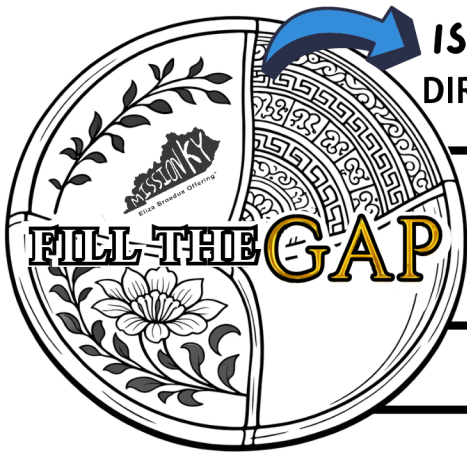
- ☐ Please pray that God helps the **Central KY Network of Baptists** connect pastors, with other churches, missionaries, and ministries so more people can know Him.

BIBLE FOCUS:

Ephesians 4:15-16 (NIV) "Instead, speaking the truth in love, we will grow to become in every respect the mature body of him who is the head, that is, Christ. From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work."

WHAT WE LEARN:

Just like a broken pot can be mended with gold to become even more beautiful, God mends us and brings us together as His church. Even though we are all different, we are joined by Jesus to grow and build each other up in love! Each one of us is an important part of God's amazing plan.

MATERIALS YOU'LL NEED:

- **Printed outline of a broken pot or vase:** (You can use one of the Kintsugi coloring pages we made, or draw a simple pot outline and add "cracks" to it.)
- **Different colored construction paper or tissue paper:** Cut into small squares or torn into small pieces (like the blue ones in your example photo). Use many different colors to show how unique each of us is!
- **Glue sticks or liquid glue**
- **Optional:** Gold glitter, gold paint, or yellow paper strips (to make the "gold mends")
- **Scissors** (if cutting paper)

LET'S BUILD OUR UNITY VESSEL!

1. **Prepare Your Pot:** Look at your printed pot outline. Imagine it's been broken, but now we're going to put it back together beautifully!
2. **Choose Your "Pieces":** Pick up different colored pieces of paper. Each color can represent a different person or a different special part of God's church (like friends, family, teachers, helpers). We are all unique, just like these different colors!
3. **Glue and Arrange:** Start gluing your colored paper pieces onto the "broken" sections of your pot outline. Try to fill in the spaces, imagining how each unique piece helps to make the pot whole again. You can overlap them a little, just like how people work together and support each other.
4. **Add the "Golden Mends" (Optional but Fun!):** Once your paper pieces are glued down, use gold glitter, gold paint, or yellow paper strips to draw or glue along the "cracks" or edges where your paper pieces meet. This is like the Kintsugi gold, showing how Jesus helps to join us together with His love, making us even more special and beautiful because of Him!
5. **Let it Dry:** Once you're done, let your beautiful Kintsugi Unity Vessel dry.

TALK ABOUT IT!

- How did all the different colored papers come together to make one beautiful pot?
- How is this like how different people in our church or family come together to make one strong group?
- What does it mean for each part to do its work? How do you do your part in your family or school?
- How does God's love (like our golden mends) help us to stay strong and grow together?

Dear Parents/Guardians,

Today your child took home an “**EBO Week of Prayer, Kids**” prayer and activity guide as part of our Week of Prayer lesson. We’d love for you to join your child in praying for Kentucky missionaries each day this week.

Families on Mission Activity: My Kintsugi Unity Vessel

Your child is also bringing home a special family activity sheet called My Kintsugi Unity Vessel. This simple hands-on project includes instructions and discussion questions designed to help your family talk about how God brings His people together to grow and serve Him.

As you complete the activity together, use the discussion questions to connect the craft to your family’s faith and mission. The activity highlights an important truth from Ephesians 4: each person has a unique role, and God joins us together through His love to build up His church.

Please send the completed Kintsugi Unity Vessel back with your child next week. We will use them to create a special classroom display celebrating how God works through all of us together.

Tips:

- Make it part of your usual routine — morning, mealtime, or bedtime all work great.
- Ask your child what they learned about the missionary that day — it helps reinforce mission-minded thinking!
- Let your child take the lead in answering the discussion questions and sharing ideas during the Kintsugi activity.
