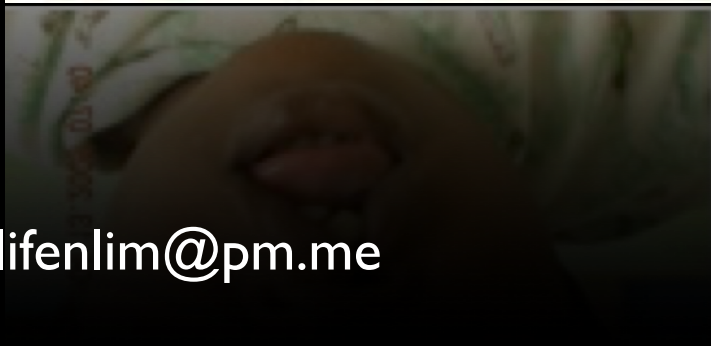

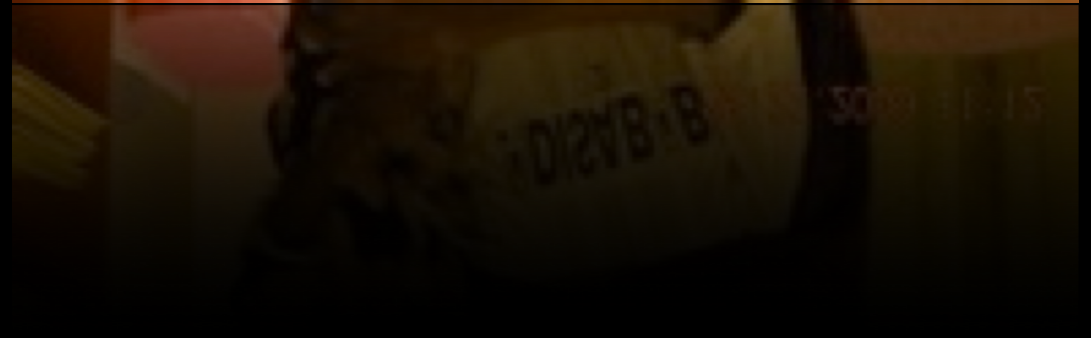

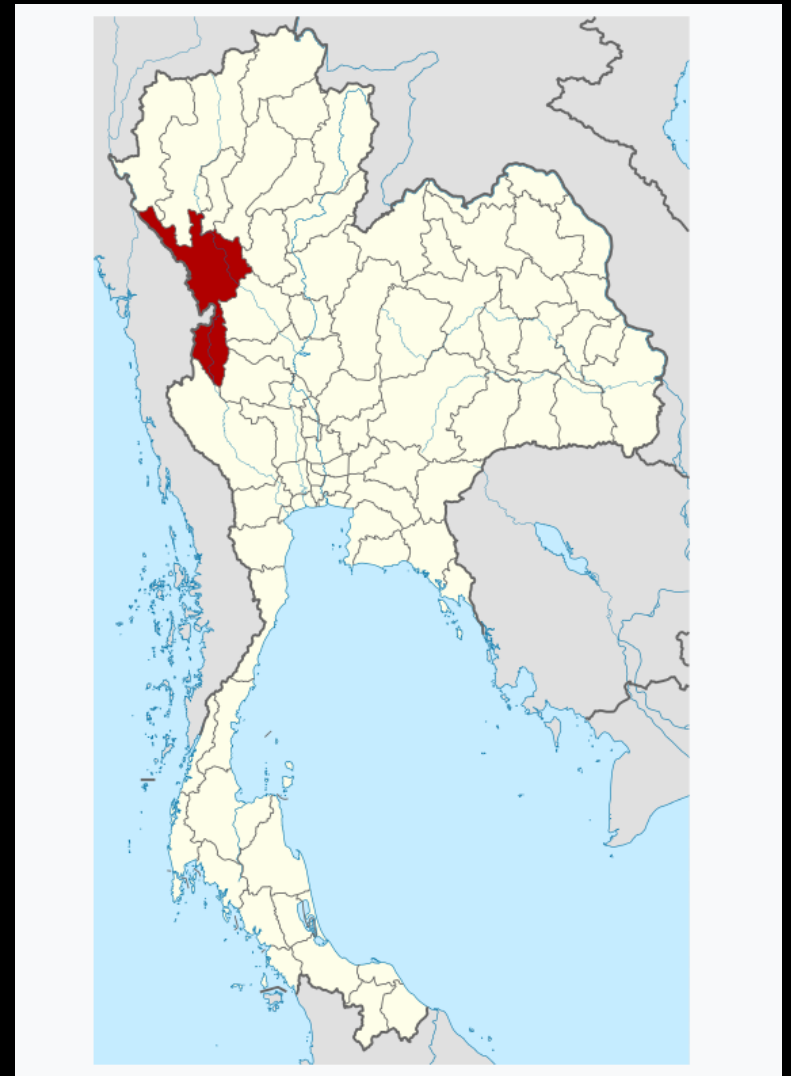

Thailand in green

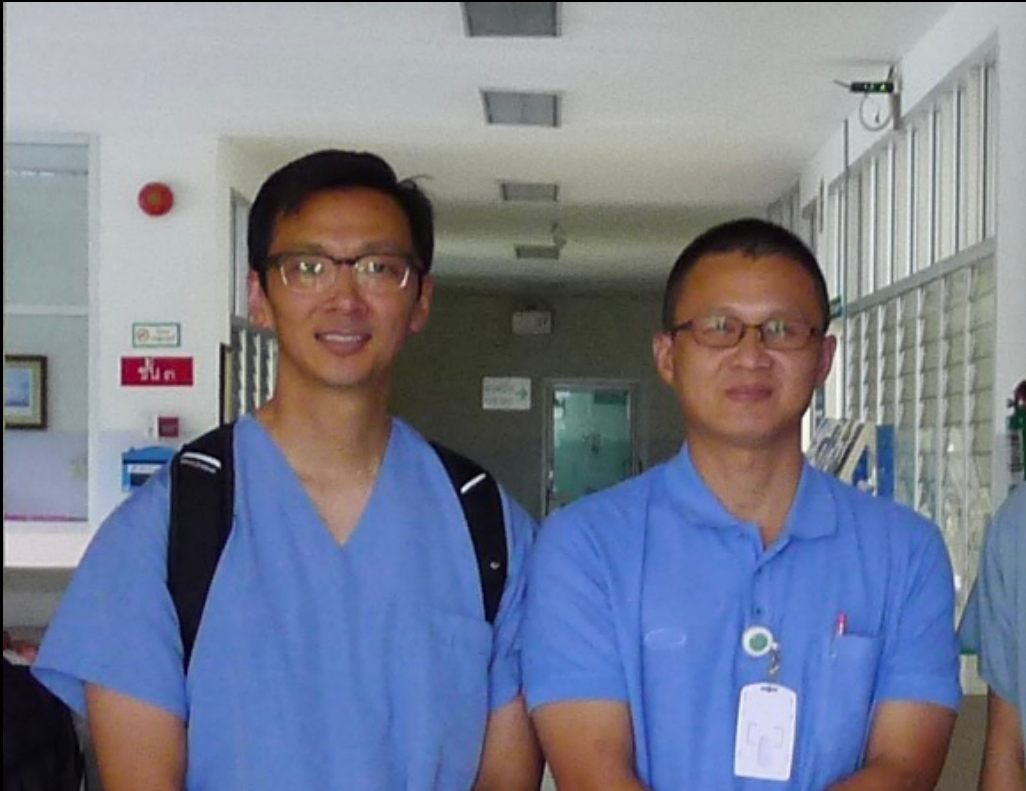
I. Unreachedness of the UPG

 - >98% Buddhist, <2% Christian
- Field location target: Umphang Village in Tak Province
 - Thai people group: 100% Buddhist, 0% Christian
