Depending on the age of your little one, use your items to practice:

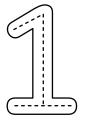
**COUNTING:** Count how many of the item you have.

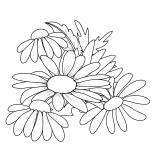

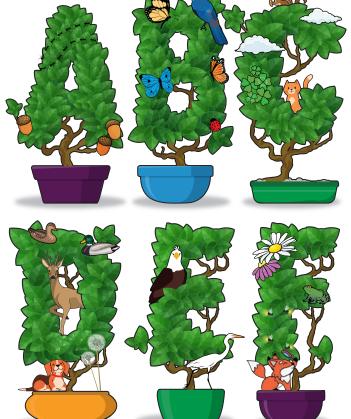


#### For little kids:

Point out things that start with a letter, or let them ask what letter the nature they see starts with.

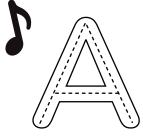
#### For older kids:

Try to make your way through the whole alphabet finding things in nature and your neighborhood for each letter!



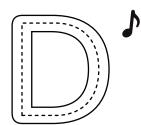
Make your evening musical and head out to your yard or around the block singing the ABCs together!







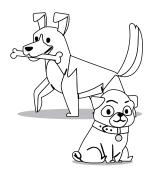
